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CWFC RAIGANJ Project



CWFC (Child & Women Friendly Communities) Raiganj reached a population of 32,000 across 12 villages in Banglabari, close to the Bangladeshi border. It is one of the most vulnerable districts in West Bengal, where only 36% of women are literate.

Empowerment of women's self-help groups is the core of CWFC. So much has changed for these village women who previously had little contact outside the home, no voice in their local community and little information about their entitlements or how to speak up for their needs. Now they:

- have greater respect from the extended family and community recognition for their involvement in development work
- ♦ speak out more confidently, raise their concerns in government forums and demand better services
- are very active in solving village problems, e.g. a new bridge has been constructed after lying broken for years; early marriages are being prevented



- play a crucial role in health services reaching the most vulnerable mothers and children. Child health, schools and local councils now seek their support
- are key members in the planning and monitoring of village government and child protection meetings
- have other livelihood opportunities, such as locally producing a supplementary nutrition, with their experience with CINI also opening up avenues for work in Government programs

The impact of these changes is far reaching, including:

- pregnant women's supplemental nutrition
- a 15% increase in early antenatal care
- more births in the safety of hospital
- 'drop out' children are back in school
- missing children returned to families
- nearly 2000 adolescents have been trained in health and protection
- more homes have toilets and
- 'below the poverty line' families are accessing government benefits

IICCHAA and ATIKRAM Projects

IICCHAA is a community-based initiative for children infected or affected by HIV/AIDS. The program now reaches 247 children from 192 families after we took on a third district, Murshidabad last year.

Families are educated about their illness, health, hygiene and nutrition. Adolescents learn about sexual health and their right to live free from sexual abuse. There is a special emphasis on safeguarding the future of the children, with support groups and home visits strengthening children's coping skills and building family communication. Community support groups also reduce

isolation and the stigma associated with the disease.

CINI's advocacy also addresses discrimination in schools, workplaces, medical care and the community.



As there is an enormous need for this very effective program, CINI is training more women facilitators to reach more families.



Atikram aims to break barriers to secondary and tertiary education faced by girls from economically disadvantaged families, so the girls leave school to marry

young, become child labourers or risk being trafficked.

Atikram provides 20 girls with mentoring, academic assistance, books, and life skills training over three years of secondary school. They receive English, Maths and Science coaching and there are plans to include computer training.

This year, two Sydney sisters made a special donation in memory of their brother, Peter Wootton. They wanted to give a little back to the country that Peter loved and where he spent much of his life. This contribution enabled CINI Australia to support the Atikram girls. We are hoping to find more supporters for the next years.

World Bank Information: an extra year of secondary schooling can increase a girl's future wages by 10-20%, that in turn affects the wellbeing of her family. (Extract: The State of The World's Girls 2009)

Young girls work together to Prevent Child Marriage in their Village

This is one of many similar stories from CINI's CWFC program in Uttar Dinajpur.

Kohinoor Khatun is a member of CINI's Bhatsia's Children Group, where she learnt about the risks of underage marriage, with her village group actively committed to preventing child marriages. In July, she heard that 16yr old Josheda was being pressured by her family to marry. Kohinoor took this to her Group who then visited the family to get more information. Josheda's family told them it was only a rumour. Later they heard the wedding was going ahead so they contacted Child Line (CINI's Child Protection Helpline). CINI staff then met the family, explained the risks and that underage marriage is illegal. The parents promised not to arrange a marriage until their daughter turned 18.

CINI's Children's Groups educate and empower adolescents to look out for each other, whilst CINI provides essential support and helps families understand the laws about child marriage.
